Presentation is Fencing and Wildlife by Kathie Jermstad

Territorialism is common among animal species. Humans may be the only species that mark territory with a physical barrier, namely fences. This presentation describes how many styles of fencing unintentionally cause harm to wildlife. Some tips on how to mitigate existing fences, and designs of purpose-effective fencing will also be shared.

Most of Kathie's 27-year career with the Pacific Southwest Research Station (USFS) was spent on conducting genomic research in conifers, mapping genes that control important adaptive traits like dormancy release and cold-hardiness, and genes responsible for resistance to the fungal pathogen that causes white pine blister rust in five-needled pines. Near the end of her career, she went from working with trees to working with wildlife, which was her original desire and training. She worked in California fisher and western pond turtle conservation, and avian nesting and reproduction. Prior to retirement in 2016, she collaborated with researchers from various agencies in road ecology and landscape connectivity, which she continues to this day. Fences are anthropogenic barriers that have a significant effect on wildlife on multiple levels, including physical harm, food and water deprivation, the inability to escape wildfires, and genetic isolation leading to inbreeding.





Based on the author's research into her grandfather's past as an adopted child, and the surprising discovery of his family of origin and how he came to be adopted, Julia Park Tracey has created a mesmerizing work of historical fiction illuminating the darkest side of the Orphan Train.

In 1859, women had few rights, even to their own children. When her husband dies and her children become wards of a predator, Martha-bereaved and scared-flees their beloved country home taking the children with her to the squalor of New York City. She manages to find them shelter in a tenement packed with other down-on-their-luck families and then endeavors to find work as a seamstress.

But as a naive woman alone, preyed on by male employers, she soon finds herself nearly destitute. Her children are hungry with no coal for their fire. Illness lays them low and Martha begins to lose hope.
