Presentation is: Researching Ancestral History for My Historical Fiction Novel by Julia Park Tracey



Julia will talk about her mysterious adopted great-grandfather and her search for who he really was. Her findings led to her writing the novel, *The Bereaved*, about a Civil War widow (her 3rd great grandmother) trying to find her children after they'd been taken away on the Orphan Trains. Further research after that led her to write her latest novel, *Silence*, about a Puritan widow who is punished with a year of silence for speaking her anguish aloud, based on her 7th great

grandmother. She is at work on another novel about other ancestors, this time in Virginia right before the Revolution of 1776, when Quakers and enslavers butted heads.

Julia Park Tracey is an award-winning author, journalist, and poet. Her affinity for family history led her to several foremothers whose stories begged to be told. *The Bereaved* tells of her third great-grandmother Martha, a poor widow, and the choices she made to survive with four hungry children as the Civil War erupted around her.

Julia was selected as Poet Laureate for the city of Alameda, California, and served from 2014 to 2017. Her short fiction and poetry have been anthologized and published in print and online in the United States, the United Kingdom, and Japan.

Julia's work has appeared in the San Francisco Chronicle, Huffington Post, Salon, Redbook, and Good Housekeeping. She has been recognized by the California Newspaper Publishers Association for her editing and writing.

Julia currently lives in Grass Valley





In 1859, women had few rights, even to their own children. When her husband dies and her children become wards of a predator, Martha bereaved and scared flees their beloved country home taking the children with her to the squalor of New York City. She manages to find them shelter in a tenement packed with other down-on-theirluck families and then endeavors to find work as a seamstress.

A naive woman alone, preyed on by male employers, she soon finds herself nearly destitute. Her children are hungry, with no coal for their fire. Illness lays them low and Martha begins to lose hope.
